## Purpose and Disclosure

The purpose of this book is to record and document, for the members of Cloverdale Lodge No. 126 A.F. & A.M., the Lodge history from its initial application in 1903, then receiving its charter in 1904, to the present time, 2004, 100 years later.

I was very fortunate, after several extended searches, to find minutes for the entire 100 years and many of the petitions of the earliest members. I also discovered some notes and a brief history prepared 46 years after the Lodge received its charter which are included in this work. They were not signed to give proper credit. but were important in this preparation.

In compiling this history, it is evident that some Lodge minutes and records are very detailed and complete, while others are vague and incomplete.

Individual member records were also available which, added to the completeness in listing and tracking each Master Mason.

I applaud the members and officers who found it important to save these important and valuable documents.

## The Early Beginning

## Desire for Lodge and Application

In 1903, ten men residing in the southern part of Tillamook County, Oregon, having been raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason in various other Lodges, felt the need to have Masonic communication in their community. These men, who had the desire to share the rights, likes, and benefits of the craft with their fellow man, petitioned the Grand Lodge of Oregon for permission to meet under its jurisdiction.

An application to form Cloverdale Lodge was presented to the Grand Lodge of Oregon at the Fifty-third Annual Communication in June, 1903. Most Worshipful W.F. Butcher, Grand Master. The application was referred to the Committee on Charters and Dispensations and by them referred to the incoming Grand Master with power to act.

## First Meeting Held

The first regular communication of Cloverdale Lodge No. 126 was held on September 5, 1903, in a room above the Cloverdale Merchantile Co., owned by Charles Ray, who settled in Tillamook County about 1884 on the farm that subsequently became the site of the community of Cloverdale,. Brother W.W. Condor opened the Lodge under dispensation on the Master Mason degree of Masonry.

## Grand Lodge Receives Committee Report

The Fifty-fourth Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Oregon, held June 15-17, 1904, in the Masonic Temple in Portland, Oregon was opened by The Most Worshipful Grand Master, S. M. Yoran. In the Grand Master's address he stated, "At the last annual session of the Grand Lodge an application for a new Lodge at Cloverdale was referred to the Committee on Charters and Dispensations, and by them referred to the incoming Grand Master with power to act. After some correspondence relative to territory, amount of material, Lodge facilities, etc. I became satisfied that the brethren were justified in making the request. I therefore, August 17, 1903, issued a dispensation for Cloverdale Lodge U.D."

# Office of Grand Master M.W. Grand Lodge A.J. & A.M. Of Oregon

Eugene, Oregon August 17, 1903

To all whom it may concern, and especially to our Brethren of Cloverdale, Oregon.

Greeting:

₩hereas, application has been made to us for a SPECIAL DISPENSATION

By a constitutional number of brethren who have been regularly vouched for and recommended, which petition sets forth that they are desirous of establishing a new Lodge at Cloverdale under our Masonic jurisdiction, and requesting a dispensation for the same-and whereas there appears to us good reason and sufficient cause for granting the prayer of the said petition.

Know ye, That we, the M.W. Grand Master of the Grand Lodge, A.F. & A.M., of Oregon, do hereby grant this, our SPECIAL DISPENSATION,

Authorizing and empowering Brother W.W. Condor to act as Worshipful Master, Bro. Charles Ray, to act as Senior Warden and Bro. Job Foster, to act as Junior Warden of a Lodge to be held under our jurisdiction at Cloverdale, and to be known as Cloverdale Lodge. And we further authorize and empower the said brethren to Enter. Pass, and Raise Free Masons according to the Ancient Constitutions of the order. The customs and usages of the craft, and the rules and regulations of the Grand Lodge of Ancient Freemasons of Oregon, and not otherwise. Ana this, our dispensation shall continue of force and effect until the Grand Lodge shall grant a Warrant of Constitution for the same, or this dispensation be revoked by us, or by the Grand Lodge aforesaid.

And for so doing, this shall be your sufficient warrant.

Done at the Grand East of Oregon, this Seventeenth day of August 1903, 5903.

S.M. Yoran Grand Master I authorized Bro. Geo. L. Gray, Grand Lecturer for this district, to meet with these brethren for the instruction of their officers and to set them to work.

Bro. Gray's Report Is As Follows

Toledo, Oregon October 17, 1903

M. W. S.M. Yoran, Eugene:

I perhaps should have reported to you sooner that as per your instructions, I went to Cloverdale, Tillamook County, September 5, 1903, and started the new Lodge there in the good work. Quite a number of brethren from Tillamook and Bay View Lodges were there and rendered valuable assistance in exemplifying the work. The brethren of the new Lodge seem to be enthusiastic, and I think will have a good Lodge. I had a hard trip in having to drive in from Sheridan over the hills about 40 miles and it rained on us nearly all the way.

We will have a strong Lodge here and will make a good report to the Grand Lodge next June.



The report of the committee on charters and dispensations made the following report. "We the committee on Charters and Dispensations, to whom was referred the petition of Cloverdale Lodge, U.D., of Cloverdale, recommend that their petition be granted and a charter and a number be assigned them."

#### Charter Granted

Cloverdale Lodge No. 126 A.F. & A.M. was chartered by the Grand Lodge of Oregon June 16, 1904, and held its meetings in the town of Cloverdale, Oregon situated 22 miles south of Tillamook, the county seat.

## First Meeting and Early Members

As mentioned in his report, Bro. G. L. Gray, Grand District Lecturer was present to set the Lodge to work. After the reading of the dispensation from the Grand Master, the Lodge proceeded to elect the following as officers. A. Compton, as Treasurer; Charles P. Nelson, Secretary. (Bros. Charles Ray and J.C. Foster has previously been authorized and empowered as Sr. Warden and Jr. Warden, respectively as listed in the special dispensation). The Worshipful Master appointed H.H. Miller, Senior Deacon; Jno. Iler, Junior Deacon; S.B. Hill, Tyler; G.W. Wallace and L.L. Shortridge, Stewards. Bro. Gray was assisted by Brothers from Tillamook and Bay City Lodges.

The first Worshipful Master, a position he held during the first three years, was Wm. W. Condor.

## Officers Jewels From Tillamook Lodge

During the first meeting in 1903, the officers jewels used were an extra set loaned by the Brothers of Tillamook Lodge. These jewels were hand carved of brass taken from a ship-wreck off the Tillamook coast. In 1926, when Tillamook moved into their new temple, they wished to place these jewels among the archives of their Lodge. A strict search was ordered through the rubbish of the temple. They were finally discovered under the platform which surrounds the hall and returned to Tillamook.

The first Thursday night on or before the full moon was chosen as their regular stated meeting. In 1903, the roads were wagon tracks or trails. The full moon was to light their way home. Many of the Brothers walked ten miles to Lodge so it is easy to believe that Masonic traditions meant a great deal to those who opened the door of Masonry to many of us. That date held until 1922 when the meetings were changed to the second Thursday of each month.

## Early Challenges and Traditions

#### The Path Ahead

It took men with a great faith in Masonry and in Cloverdale Lodge to see it through the first ten years. It was a struggle to maintain the Lodge as a working body both financially and in having sufficient members present to set the Lodge to work. Many times the Lodge was opened with just a few members present. It was a rare occasion to see all of the chairs filled.

Most of the members were new settlers in a new community with large families so the common way of paying dues was on the installment plan or not paying at all for many years. In spite of these difficulties, however, the Lodge slowly grew.

## Where the lodge met

The Lodge continued to meet in the Cloverdale Merchantile Co., a two-storied building located on the west side of the main street of Cloverdale. Payments of \$20 per year were paid through 1913 and then increased to \$60 per year for the years 1914 through 1919. In 1920, a serious fire completely burned nearly all of the buildings in that portion of Cloverdale, including a hotel, motion picture house, telephone office and post office. It is not clear whether the Lodge moved its meeting location prior to the fire or because of the fire to the Independent Order of Odd Fellows (IOOF) Hall across the street. But the important outcome was that the Lodge records were not lost.

The Grand Lodge of Oregon issued a Special Dispensation "to move the Lodge hall from the old quarters to the Oddfellows Hall in Cloverdale, Oregon." was signed September 6, 1920. A copy of this document has been placed in this text. The first Lodge meeting in the IOOF hall occurred September 9, 1920. The rent from 1920 through 1944 was \$60 per year, increasing to \$100 per year from 1945 to 1954. In 1955, the rent was structured at \$6 per meeting and in 1959 to \$8 per meeting.

## Lodge Looks to the Future

In 1947, a building committee consisting of seven members was formed to look for property in the Cloverdale area as a site for a new lodge. In that year, a 50-foot lot owned by Mollie Fox, and priced at \$300, was considered.

In December 1950, the members were considering the purchase of the old Cloverdale Grade School, but the motion failed. At the same meeting, Bro. Elma Johnson offered a building site which the Building Committee was instructed to investigate. A year later the members again looked at the old Cloverdale Grade School and in April 1952 passed a motion to purchase the school for \$2,000 if it could be financed. One month later plans to purchase the old school were dropped.

In April 1952, the Lodge members accepted Brother Elma Johnson's donation of an acre of land two miles south of Cloverdale as the new building site. The building committee reviewed several plans and discussed various materials, including block construction (even talked about making the blocks) and later changed to that of a wood structure. A groundbreaking ceremony was held on June 27, 1954. Lodge finances would not permit the building to be constructed and the property eventually went back to Bro. Johnson.

Brother Earl Binford, on May 8, 1958, approached the Oddfellows Lodge in Cloverdale with an offer to purchase one-half interest in its property, but they declined.

On March 12, 1959 a letter was received from the Golden West Social Club informing the Lodge that the East Beaver School House in Hemlock was to be sold by sealed bid. Following a discussion, a committee consisting of Brothers Charles Ewards, Earl Binford and Roy Dunn were assigned to investigate and report on the potential of being able to convert the building to Lodge needs. After several meetings with the School Board, the efforts of Cloverdale Lodge members to have their own Lodge building were noted in the minutes of the meeting of May 14, 1959, when they "voted to submit a bid of \$525 on the Hemlock School house and contents as advertised and to get the building association back to work on this matter."

The offer was accepted and the first meeting in the new building was a Special Communication August 13, 1959. The first meeting in the school house was held on August 13, 1959, with 15 members present. Refreshments were served on tables made of doors placed on sawhorses. At the early meetings, members attended in work clothes and progressed with the renovation after Lodge Extensive work followed including the addition of a dining room in the early 1970s.

This building, in 2004, continues to be used by Cloverdale Lodge No. 126 and Golden West Chapter No. 138, Order of the Eastern Star.

## Membership and Occupations

Gains and Losses

As one might expect, in the first twenty years of Cloverdale Lodge, the majority of the members resided in Cloverdale, Oretown, Woods and Meda as getting to Cloverdale for meetings and returning home took a long time. Their occupations were exactly as one might expect in the early 1900s in the rural area of south Tillamook County, which included dairy farmers, merchants, blacksmith, laborer, cheesemaker, teacher, canneryman, and insurance solicitor. Later years saw occupations such as minister, physician, logger, barber, electrician, truck driver, and butcher. Following World War II, our members worked in the woods, as logger, log truck driver, and cat skinner. Other members served as highway worker, oysterman, garage operator, resort owner, forest ranger, and newspaper editor.

Beginning with 10 members in 1903, when the Lodge was under dispensation, Cloverdale Lodge had 14 members by April 1904. The membership totaled 20 members by 1910. It was also in that year that Cloverdale Lodge started its first tradition which included having relatives and friends present for installations to view the work and enjoy a banquet or oyster feed. By 1919, the Lodge had grown to 38 members. During the three-year period between 1920 and 1923 the Lodge was very busy when 28 members were raised, bringing the total membership in 1923 to 67. The years leading to the Great Depression saw only a slight growth. In 1956, the U.S. Air Force established a radar station on top of Mount Hebo at an elevation of 3,174 feet. This brought an influx of men to the area, and many became members of Cloverdale Lodge, and some are still active members today. Cloverdale Lodge reached an historic high of 101 members in 1959. This mirrors the Grand Lodge of Oregon, which also reached its highest membership at that time. The radar station was abandoned in 1981.

The present membership of the Lodge includes many retired members from a wide variety of occupations which, when employed, included teacher, forester, businessman, dairy farmer, deputy sheriff, electrician, barber, contractor, executive, U.S. Air Force, and brick mason. Now, in November 2004, the lodge has 37 members, 18 of whom were raised in Cloverdale Lodge, and 19 are members by affiliation. The current average age of the membership is 71 years.

## Points In History

# Interesting Recorded Events from the Minutes (Many typed just as they were recorded)

September 14, 1903	A bill of \$50 favor of Charles P. Nelson for money advanced for dispensation fee ordered paid.
October 1, 1903	A petition for initiation from Mr. Wm. Ray enclosing the usual amount and recommended by Bro. Chas. Ray and Chas. P. Nelson was referred to a committee of investigation consisting of Bros. L.L. Shortridge, Jno Iler, and S.B. Hill.
February 6, 1904	Bro. Wm. Ray became the first member to be raised in Cloverdale Lodge. Visiting from Tillamook Lodge No. 57 were Bros. Fred Arthur, Thomas Coats, T.B. Handley, and Prof. Wiley.
August 5, 1907	S. M. Yoran, Grand Lecturer, Eugene Lodge No. 11, "gave the brethren some good and useful instructing on Masonry".
April 13, 1911	Sent \$10 to Florence Lodge No. 107 in their response for aid to help rebuild their burned lodge home.
December 25, 1912	The evening of Christmas Day. Installation of Officers for 1913.
January 21, 1921 Through October 12, 1922	Individual donations, and Lodge fund raisers, including a basket social, to meet quota for the Masonic Home being constructed in Forest Grove.
March 8, 1922	Agreed to pay the Lodge Secretary \$12 per year for his work. (This amount was still being paid in 1935).
September 19, 1924	Opened a Special Communication for the purpose of studying the Constitution of the United States.
The 1920s through 1930s	Cloverdale Lodge and Golden West Chapter O.E.S. held joint installations each December which included a big oyster feed.
January 14, 1932	Motion made to have one of the candlesticks presented by Bro. John Dyke be suitably engraved to commemorate Bro. Dyke's name. Bro. Grewell be instructed to build an altar for the Lodge. (Editors note: these candlesticks are still in use today).
March 10, 1932	Motion made to have picture of George Washington framed.
October 8, 1936	The Lodge donated \$35 to the Bandon Lodge for relief.

September 11, 1941	Motion made and carried to draw warrant on the treasury to purchase defense bonds to amount of \$300 maturity.
February 10, 1944	Motion made to purchase one \$100 series F bond.
June 8, 1944	The Lodge to sponsor the 5 <sup>th</sup> War Loan Drive for the Cloverdale precinct
March 10, 1949	Motion passed to have the Declaration of Independence framed.
December 14, 1950	Motion made to try to buy the Cloverdale Grade School building. Motion failed.  Bro. Elma Johnson offers building site and the building committee be instructed to investigate the site. Motion passed.
November 29, 1951	Bro. Hodge reported on looking at old grade school building and asked for committee to look it over and talk to Mr. Dougherty.
April 10,1952	Motion made, seconded and passed to purchase old grade school building for \$2,000 provided it can be financed.
June 12, 1952	Motion to drop plan to purchase grade school building carried.
August 7, 1952	Motion made, seconded and passed to accept Bro. Elma Johnson's offer of the land (with certain restrictions).
November 12, 1953	Communication from the Grand Master asking for canned goods for the Masonic and Eastern Star Home.
June 10,1954	Motion passed to have the groundbreaking for the new hall on June 27, 1954.
July 8, 1954	Bro. Earl Binford reported on sodbreaking ceremonies of June 27 <sup>th</sup> .
November 20, 1954	Cloverdale Lodge hosted a reception for the Grand Master at Nestucca High School as the Lodge was not large enough to accommodate the anticipated attendance.
December 8, 1955	Motion passed that in 1956 the Lodge meet on the second and fourth Thursdays and pay rent to the IOOF at a rate of \$6 per night.
May 8, 1958	Communication from IOOF announcing that as of July 1, 1958, rent for the hall would be \$8 per night.
September 11, 1958	Bro. Elma Johnson reported that people were trespassing on the Masonic lot and asked permission to run a wire across the front.
March 12, 1959	Communication read from the Golden West Social Club informing the Lodge that the East Beaver (Hemlock) school house would be sold soon. A committee was appointed to determine the possibility of the Lodge being able to use it.

May 14, 1959	Motion passed to submit a bid of \$525 on Hemlock school house and contents as advertised.
August 13, 1959	First meeting of Cloverdale Lodge held in the old Hemlock School house which included 11 officers and 4 additional members.
September 10, 1959	Members and a number of visiting brethren from Tillamook were present, clad in work clothes and after closing Lodge, much progress was made toward completion of the new home.
November 12, 1959	Motion passed to revise the by-laws to change the north boundary of Cloverdale Lodge to Highway 101 at Simmons Creek and easterly up Simmons Creek.
April 14, 1960	Bro. Clarence Dunn presented with a Life Membership as a gift from the Lodge in appreciation for his many years of work for Masonry. (Editors note: Bro. Dunn served the Lodge as secretary for 26 years).
June 8, 1961	"Bro. Edwards reported that he and Wor. Bro. Shermer had taken the smokes and books to the Masonic and Eastern Star Home and they were very well received.
March 14, 1963	A joint resolution with Taft Lodge No. 200 was read, establishing the boundary line between the two Lodges as the county line between the two counties.
October 14, 1965	The Lodge agreed to give the Nazarene Church, next to the Lodge, the use of the building October 15 & 16 for their meeting.
October 5, 1968	Many members of Cloverdale Lodge attended a reception in Tillamook for Warren A. McMinimee, Grand Master of Masons in Oregon and a member of Tillamook Lodge No. 57 A.F. & A.M.
April 9, 1970	Concrete blocks for construction of the dining room were hauled from Portland by Bro. Ray Morgan.
May 12, 1970	Bro. Ray Bailey followed our accustomed practice of depositing 1 cent for each year of his age and paid 100 cents to the birthday box. Thanks, Brother, and congratulations for having attained such a ripe old age.
October 10, 1974	The Golden West Social Club is having a spaghetti and meatball dinner October 18 <sup>th</sup> . The cost of the dinner is \$1.99 for adults and \$1.00 for children.  A discussion was held concerning the Jade plant in the Lodge. It was suggested that someone should take it to the nurseryman in Beaver, as he has several of these plants. (Editors note: future

	minutes did not report the outcome of the Jade plant or whether it ever returned to the Lodge).
April 17, 1975	A meeting was held to honor graduating honor students from Nestucca High School. There were approximately 20 students and 60 Masons and guests in attendance.
June 9, 1977	The Lodge improvement committee was given authority and finances to construct new seats on both sides of the Lodge meeting room during the summer. A cloth covering has been purchased.
April 13, 1978	It was reported that the paneling of the dining room would be finished by the next meeting.
March 23, 1979	Cloverdale Lodge offers Golden West Chapter No. 138 O.E.S. 49% interest in the Masonic Temple and grounds at Hemlock, Oregon. Golden West will be expected to pay the same percentage, 49%, of all expenses incurred on the building including maintenance, upkeep, improvement and replacement.
March 13, 1980	The back door of the Lodge now has a nice porch and set of steps.
May 14, 1981	The Lodge held an honor students banquet for 15 graduating seniors of Nestucca Union High School. Members of the faculty also spoke and the program included musical entertainment.
December 8, 1988	Wor. Bro. Lee Good was installed as Tyler. He is a 61 year member of the Lodge and holder of a Lifetime Proficiency Certificate.
December 9, 1993	The secretary reported that we had 53 members, 20 of which are life members.
December 8, 1996	Lodge officers for 1997 were installed in a joint installation in Bay City Lodge No. 102 with the other three lodges in the district.
March 9, 1998	The lodge changed the stated meeting to the second Saturday at 9 A.M., excluding July and August.
October 8, 2004	Approved the expenditure of \$150 for the purchase of food for the Nestucca Valley Elementary School to hold a spaghetti dinner to raise money for Outdoor School.

## Lodge Fees

#### Annual dues

Annual dues for Cloverdale Lodge members were \$4 per year in 1904. That amount remained in effect until 1922, when dues were increased to \$6 per year. The dues were increased to \$8 per year in 1950. In 1961, dues were increased to \$10 per year, and to \$12 per year in 1971. In 1975, dues were set at \$16 per year and raised to \$20 per year in 1981. The current dues of \$25 per year has been in effect since 1996.

## Fees for Degrees

The fees to become a member of Cloverdale Lodge by initiation in 1904 were \$30 for the degrees, which increased to \$35 for the years 1918-1919. From 1920 to 1934, the cost was \$60, then reduced to \$50 from 1935 to 1937. In 1938, the fee went to \$60 until 1947, when they were increased to the current rate of \$75.

## Geographic Area of Membership

In the early years of Cloverdale Lodge, the jurisdictional area of membership included the southern portion of Tillamook County. An area bounded on the north by Pleasant Valley, extending south to the county line with Lincoln County, west to the Pacific Ocean and into the Coast Range.

Some of the communities and landmarks within this area include:

#### Cloverdale

Cloverdale was founded and named by Charles Ray (1851-1925), who settled in Tillamook County about 1884 on the farm that subsequently became the site of the community. He later established a store, hotel, bank and cheese factory at Cloverdale, and was a charter member of Cloverdale Grange. It is apparent that the name is descriptive of the surroundings, which constitute fine dairy country. The name was suggested by Cloverdale, California, where Ray occasionally visited.<sup>1</sup>

### Sandlake

The Sandlake post office is not far from Sand Lake, which is near the shores of the Pacific Ocean. As is customary, many names of the type are telescoped into one word by postal authorities. The post office was established with the name Hembree on July 10, 1890, with A. J. Hembree first postmaster. The name was changed to Sandlake on June 18, 1898.

#### Mt. Hebo

Warren Vaughn, a Tillamook County Pioneer, tells that the name of this mountain was originally Heave Ho because it seems to have been heaved up above the surrounding area. However, the name has been corrected to Hebo.

#### Hebo

This small town south of Tillamook is named for Mount Hebo, an important peak in the Coast Range. The Hebo post office was established in 1882, with George M. Bodyfelt first postmaster.

## Meda

This community is located on the Little Nestucca River. The post office moved around a lot and at one time was mid-way between Oretown and Dolph. The post office was established May 11, 1887, with William Yates the first postmaster. It has been said that Meda was the name of Yates' sweetheart in England who died just before or just after Yates left England.

#### Woods

The town in the southern part of the county was founded and named for Joseph Woods who settled there about 1875. The post office was established about 1886, with William Booth as the first postmaster. It was Booth who named the town in honor of Woods. The post office was closed August 29, 1935.

#### Oretown

The community in the southern part of the county was first to have been named Ore City, but due to the fear of confusion with Oregon City, the name was made Oretown. Among the early settlers in this region were Chris Christensen, the first postmaster, James B. Upton, and S.H. Rock.

## Pacific City

Peter Murray was the first postmaster of this town. The post office was established on July 31, 1909. The town derives its name from its location beside the Pacific Ocean.

## Neskowin

The post office was established in 1886 and known as Slab Creek. In1925, Sarah H. Page, postmaster, heard an Indian say as he pointed to the nearby stream, "Neskowin, Neskowin." She asked him what Neskowin meant and he said "plenty fish, plenty fish." So on October 7, 1925, the stream name was changed from Slab Creek to Neskowin Creek.

#### Beaver

This small community was named for the fur-bearing, industrious little animal that was sought after by the early trappers. A general merchandise store was started on the Joseph Bixby place in 1889, and was so successful that it moved to Beaver. There was also a cheese factory here, although in the main it was simply a trading center for the surrounding farms.

#### Blaine

A town on the Big Nestucca River was named by William Smith, the first postmaster, for James G. Blaine. Blaine, at one time was a Republician candidate for the presidency of the United States. Smith was appointed postmaster in 1892 by John Wanamaker.
